World Art Day: Downtown Art Walk Programming

In honor of IAA's World Art Day, the Downtown Art Walk proposes to dedicate our April Lounge to promoting the event. The Lounge offers free curated exhibitions to the public during Art Walk on the second Thursday of every month, hosting over 2000 visitors throughout the evening. Additionally, we will reach out to over 40 local galleries to help promote WAD participation and programming, both on April 9th (the second Thursday of April), and on World Art Day on April 15th. Lastly, we will raise awareness for the event to over 100,000 Art Walk fans on social media.

About the Downtown Los Angeles Art Walk

The Downtown Los Angeles Art Walk (DTLAAW) is a free self-guided tour that takes place on the second Thursday of every month. Welcoming over 10,000 art walkers to Downtown's Historic Core, the Art Walk promotes local artists, galleries and businesses, and offers free cultural programming not only to visitors, but also to schools, local organizations, and underserved populations. Celebrating its 10th year, the DTLAAW has grown its daily activities from the monthly walk to include the Historic Core Mural Tours, Art Collectors' Tours, the Plein Air Festival, and other educational programs. DTAAW is a nonprofit and reaches out to the public sector for sponsorship. With the full range of social channels, DTLAAW has over 100,000 fans on Facebook as well as growing numbers of followers on Instagram, Twitter, and other media. The Downtown Art Walk Team

Qathryn Brehm

Downtown Art Walk Executive Director Qathryn Brehm began working with the organization four years ago as the Director of Operations. Since then, she has refocused the event to better serve the community and shine a spotlight on the artists, galleries and arts organizations who make Downtown's Historic Core such a unique and vibrant place in L.A.'s cultural landscape. As a member of the Arts and Culture Stakeholders Group, Brehm collaborates with museums, theaters, venues and cultural centers to showcase Downtown as Los Angeles' arts and culture epicenter.

Brehm was a professional commercial and decorative artist for over 20 years with a background in trompe l'oeil and faux finishes. Over the last ten years, she has worked in the marketing and community relations arena and is responsible for several community beautification projects. She has received Congressional and City of Los Angeles recognition for her contributions in art education and as a community leader.

Brehm is an exhibiting artist and has recently published her first book on a newly-developed body of work.

Nat George

Nat George is a Los Angeles visual artist and curator. Her work explores alternative, collaborative, and artist-led initiatives that reflect changing paradigms in how we exhibit, write about, and critique art. Although she works in a variety of mediums, her focus remains largely based in painting and new media.

George has been leading curatorial projects since 2006, bringing art industry contributors together to showcase emerging and mid-career artists at various venues in the Los Angeles area. She is a principal contributor to the DAC Gallery in Downtown Los Angeles and has developed in-house programming and curated numerous exhibitions in the space over the last five years.

Working with the Downtown Art Walk, George develops partnerships between businesses in the Historic Core of Los Angeles and the local arts community. Additionally, George writes for the Art section of My L.A. Lifestyle, and serves on the board of Twitter Art Exhibit, an international exhibition powered by social media featuring the works of hundreds of participating artists to support a local

nonprofit in a host city.



Art Meets Architecture: The Fine Arts Building, 811 W. 7th Street

Extraction Lyrique, featuring French photographer Marie-Pierre, will be making its first ever debut on Art Walk evening from 6 to 8pm in the Fine Arts Building. Her photos, which have been described as "keys that open to the world of imaginary travels", are heavily surreal and serve as a testimony to the discoveries that can be made in both nature and at random. The exhibition, which is accessible to the public 24/7 will open with an intimate reception *"featuring/including"* music from a live jazz ensemble.

Howard Griffin Gallery - 410 South Spring Street, Los Angeles CA 90013

Pablo Delgado emerged in 2011 as one of London's most important street artists, quickly developing a cult following. Delgado's work is both populist and conceptual; he is known for his miniature paste-up scenes in which he rearranges existing imagery from mass media or popular culture into surreal and humorous compositions. In his latest exhibition, *On Their Level*, Delgado challenges the viewer's perspective by literally changing their point of view and in doing so playfully explores perceptions of society, equality, consumerism and cosmic significance.

GDCA Gallery, Wiznu Labs, Carol Cirillo Stanley Gallery

The Gloria Delson Contemporary Arts Gallery, The Carol Cirillo Stanley Studio Gallery, and WIZNU Labs Gallery have partnered to present a World Art Day panel discussion, "Local and Global, Integrating Worlds". Miguel Osuna Art Studio

Providing the public with an opportunity to see both works in progress as well as pieces from his latest series, "The Bends", Miguel Osuna Art Studio will be opening its doors on Art Walk night as part of a collaborative effort between Art Walk and local businesses to promote World Art Day on April 15th! His studio, which currently has several installation pieces up for display, is an incredible space filled with inspiration from all over the world. Osuna, who studied architecture in Mexico and then later moved to Los Angeles, practiced architectural design in diverse industries through 2001 and then starting painting full time in 2002 while visiting to Buenos Aires. Upon return to California, he engaged in an exploration of Los Angeles, his adopted hometown, through an extensive series of abstract landscape paintings that still continues. His studio practice frequently involves investigations on different techniques, applications and materials.

Tod Lychkoff Gallery

Two paintings, which have been specifically selected for World Art Day, will be discussed at the Tod Lychkoff Studio/Gallery, on Thursday, April 9th during Art Walk and on World Art Day, Wednesday, April 15th. Diego Cardosa Gallery

As an international artist living and painting in Los Angeles, Diego Cardosa's artwork serves as an ongoing testament to the ever evolving character of Downtown LA. In his gallery and studio space, Diego has displayed a myriad of vibrant paintings that reveal deep roots to artists such as Edward Hooper, David Hockney, and Georgia O'Keffe. Painted using a Van Gogh esque color palette, his work is best classified as "Magical Realism" in that he uses his brush in a fashion similar to that of language Gabriel Garcia Marquez used to describe the social realities and occurrences foretold in his work. "LA is a city of immigrants and movement", Cardosa explains. "They [immigrants] are always on the move, literally and figuratively" and, as a result, "the remaking of LA remains a constant element within my work".

Downtown Art Walk presents World Art Day! The first USA Participation!

Spotlight: Art Meets Architecture

Step into the Fine Arts Building in Downtown Los Angeles and you step back into an era when art and architecture merged with breathtaking panache. A landmark Romanesque Revival hidden gem, the building was constructed in 1926 to house the studios of local Downtown Los Angeles artists. Remarkably, the tradition lives on thanks to curator Lisa Ames and her husband Mark who run Art Meets Architecture, a curatorial initiative that has become a mainstay of Downtown's historical heritage. Their motto: "Presenting 21st century art in extraordinary architectural settings."

Lisa, a former preschool art teacher and Mark, a building design consultant, moved to the Historic Core of Los Angeles in 2007, after widely exploring the area's classic architecture and burgeoning art scene. "We first discovered everything we could about Downtown, and often during the Downtown Los Angeles Art Walks," says Lisa. "We ended up moving into a loft at the Eastern Columbia building, an Art Deco landmark that's within walking distance of the area's extraordinary architecture, like the Fine Arts Building."

Lisa's tenure as curator for the 17 showcases in the Fine Arts Building lobby began in 2010. "It started with a simple question" she says. "What do artists need most? The opportunity to showcase their work." Earlier that year she had discovered the work of painters/sculptors Raffi Musakhanyan and his son, Argishti Musakhanyan, during a Downtown Los Angeles Art Walk. "Their work was fantastic. Surreal. We couldn't stop talking about it. So, the next day we decided to cross over the line from going to see art, collecting art, enjoying art and telling people about it, to actually exhibiting artists' work. Our first show was with Raffi and Argishti at the Fine Arts Building." She adds, "These two artists changed my life.

In mid-2010, Mark was commissioned to work in San Francisco and the couple took up temporary residence in a hotel while keeping their loft in Downtown LA. The move was serendipitous. "The hotel happened to be next door to the 1921 Cadillac showroom [Don Lee Building] at 1000 Van Ness Avenue which we both agreed was a to-die-for building," says Mark. The San Francisco landmark building, on the National Register of Historic Places, seemed the perfect venue for the couple to hold another Musakhanyan father and son show. "We took a leap of faith and leased the 3900 square foot historic showroom," says Lisa. The Musakhanyans' show was a hit and continued for five months. "That's when our concept for Art Meets Architecture was born," she explains.

In late 2010, with successful exhibitions under their belt, the couple expanded their reach further. "As soon as we were finished in San Francisco I approached the owners of the retail space in our Eastern Columbia building in Downtown about showing the Musakhanyans' work," says Lisa. "They loved the idea." By 2013, the couple was juggling exhibitions at six different spaces simultaneously.

During this period, they also transformed their loft into a private, gallery-like space called The Salon. Guests were invited to meet the artists whose works were on display. "I would bring smaller portions of the shows that I had at the Fine Arts Building as a way to extend that experience," says Lisa. "It's so personal when you work with artists, that actually having a chance to live with a collection of their work was amazing." Their relationship with the Fine Arts Building deepened in 2015 when they were introduced to Priscilla Schwarz, the granddaughter of Burt W. Johnson (1890-1927) who created the exterior cast stone reliefs and interior bronze sculptures that decorate the building. These include three child figures placed in the lobby's fountain, which were modeled after Johnson's children. Titled, The High Note Fountain, there is a boy playing a flute and two girls each holding a fish. "The boy is Priscilla's uncle, and the girl is her mother, who is still alive," explains Lisa. "Her mother remembers when she was about four years old posing in the studio for her father."

Lisa curated Priscilla's show at the Fine Arts Building in 2016, highlighting Johnson's work there during the 1920s. Lisa recalls an emotional moment at the exhibition opening: "Sadly, Burt W. Johnson had a weak heart and passed away in 1927 when he was only 37 years old. It was just months after the Fine Arts Building opened in 1926. He was at the height of his career. And for the longest time, I couldn't tell that story without getting all teary eyed. Because there was his granddaughter Priscilla, who had never met him, 90 years later, celebrating his legacy with her own historical exhibition about him."

Lisa went on to also curate an exhibition in the Fine Arts Building of works in marble by Priscilla's brother Casey. "Casey also didn't know his grandfather, but he inherited his sculpting tools and then became a sculptor himself. It's just extraordinary isn't it?"

It was also in 2015 that the Ameses learned about World Art Day when exhibiting the works of French photographer Marie-Pierre Desaize. "She was an ambassador of the organization, and suggested we participate," explains Lisa. "I said to her, 'World Art Day! Who doesn't love that idea? Yes, we want to be a part of it."

World Art Day was established by the International Association of Art (IAA)in partnership with UNESCO to "promote international collaboration through art." Leonardo da Vinci's birthday on April 15 was chosen as the date for the annual event, and the first World Art Day was held in 2012. The origins of the IAA go back to 1948 with concerns over artists' freedom and safety in various countries. The first official Assembly was held in 1954 with 18 countries taking part, and observers from another 22 countries. Artists influencing the formation of this important NGO included Miro, Braque, Delaunay, Vasarely, Pasmore, and Calder, among many others.

After Marie-Pierre's suggestion, the Ameses quickly approached Downtown Los Angeles Art Walk Executive Director Qathryn Brehm and Nat George, Director of Curation and Special Projects, about joining the event. They immediately rallied interest from local galleries participating in the monthly Art Walk. Through their combined efforts, and Marie-Pierre's exhibition at the Fine Arts Building, Los Angeles became the first city to host a World Art Day celebration in the United States on April 15, 2015. This was followed by the formation of the first official U.S. Chapter of the IAA in 2017.

This year, with articles of incorporation in hand, IAA/USA is seeking professional artists across the United States to become members. The goal is to widen interest in World Art Day nationally, and to offer a range of support and opportunities to U.S. artists. Their plans include dividing the country into five regions, each with a representative chapter.

The Ameses moved out of their Downtown loft last year to be closer to family, but Lisa continues to curate two-month-long exhibitions and other cultural happenings at the Fine Arts Building. As part of Art Meets Architecture's programming, she invites one or two curators every year. Now on view until June 9th is "The Essence" exhibition, with captivating paintings by Italian artist Stefano Panichi organized by guest curator Anna Dusi. "We worked together on this project for about one year, to create an international exhibit timed with World Art Day," explains Lisa. If you haven't yet experienced this Downtown treasure with its amazing architecture and art, now is the time, she adds. The Lobby of the Fine Arts Building is open to the public 8am-8pm daily.

After Albrecht Dürer's Philosophy: "Art is within Nature, we have to extract it", all her photos are representations of the reality, the testimony of discoveries made in nature and at random, thanks to the purely artistic eye of a painter which guides the artist and interpolates lines and colors, forms and materials, lighting and composition. It is a work of research suggestive of New Realism, and the outcome, Surrealism which virtually brings the spectator to the edge of a "new Automatic Writing".



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
Writing Contest Prizes Ceremony & WAD Diplomas Ceremony

A proposal was put forward at the 17th General Assembly of the International Association of Art in Guadalajara to declare April 15 as World Art Day, with the first celebration held in 2012. This proposal was sponsored by Bedri Baykam of Turkey and co-signed by Rosa Maria Burillo Velasco of Mexico, Anne Pourny of France, Liu Dawel of China, Christos Symeonides of Greek Cyprus, Anders Liden of Sweden, Kan Irle of Japan, Pavel Kral of Slovakia, Dev Chooramun of Mauritius, and Hilde Rognskog of Norway. It was accepted unanimously by the General Assembly.^{[113][4]}

The date was decided in honor of the birthday of Leonardo da Vinci.(ownpage) Da Vinci was chosen as a symbol world peace, freedom of expression, tolerance, brotherhood and multiculturalism as well as art's important to other fields.^{[2][4]}

Past celebrations [edit]

The first World Art Day on April 15, 2012 was supported by all IAA national committees and 150 artists, including those of France, Sweden, Slovakia, South Africa, Cyprus and Venezuela, but the intention of the event is universal ^{[3][4]} Events varied from special museum hours to conferences and more.^[1] For example Venezuela held outdoor art exhibitions with paintings, sculptures, prints, video and more, as well as a Florentline cooking demonstration in honor of Da Vinci.^[4]

More events were held in 2013 all over the world including the Mbombela municipal art museum in South Africa.^[5] However, there was controversy at celebrations in Sweden when the Swedish minister of Culture, Lena Adelsohn Liljeroth, cut into the genitals of a cake representing a black African woman. The performance art was meant to be a statement against cenital multilation but many found the depiction racist.^[6]

World Art Day has also been supported online, especially by the Google Art Project.[7]

World Art Day/IAA is next week April 15th, 2015 and the Downtown Art Walk is leading the way and putting Downtown Los Angeles on the map as one of the first sites in the US to take part in World Art Day! Along with special events happening around the neighborhood April 15th, we're holding a contest in collaboration with IAA-UNESCO and French artist Marie-Pierre, alias O.d'Offin.
